From the Introduction: "Stoic philosophy, of which Epictetus (c. a.d. 50–130) is a representative, began as a recognizable movement around 300 b.c. Its founder was Zeno of Cytium (not to be confused with Zeno of Elea, who discovered the famous paradoxes). He was born in Cyprus about 336 b.c., but all of his philosophical activity took place in Athens.

Epictetus, born about 50, died between 125 and 130 AD, was a greek slave before becoming a philosopher. Epictetus is not his proper name: épiktétos meant, in Greek, slave, servant. Epictetus taught the Stoic doctrine in Rome and had to emigrate in Epirus, at Nicopolis, where he attracted many disciples, expressing a real lifestyle.
